Report from Recreation Director, Janet Schork

<u>Crabapple Pool:</u> Crabapple is now closed for the season. Although the weather was not very good, attendance was steady throughout the season and we achieved our number one goal of having no accidents or major injuries. Pool Manager, Yvonne Shawl, Assistant Pool Manager's, Alex Schork, Megan Vanyo, and Julia Dandar, all did an excellent job managing our daily operations as well as credit to our Maintenance, our Concession, and our Lifeguard staff. They were all outstanding! Clint Strosko has started the Pool shutdown process. Once fall baseball is over for the season, we can turn off the water and complete winterizing procedures. At the end of each season, we review and evaluate what was done correctly and what we can do to improve our customers experience for next year. Thank you, Alan Fossi, for weeding and cleaning up the Library hillside, Bruno Field sign, and Town Square landscaping.

Recreation Center: Currently accepting reservations now for our resident sports groups for the 2019/2020 gym season at the Recreation Center. Evening time slots are filling up quickly and if you know any sports groups that are interested have them call Janet Schork. November 1, 2019 is set for the final date for our residents and then we will start to accept non-resident groups reservations at that time. On the agenda are the rental rates for the Board of Supervisors review and approval. My recommendation is for no change in the rental rates from last year. Gym rental for residents in the Yough area is \$30.00 per hour. Non-resident rental is \$50.00 per hour.

We are grateful for your service and your service to your community. May God richly bless you and May God Bless America.

Public Comment

Dr. Janet Sardon made the following statement. I have had the pleasure and honor of being the Superintendent for the Yough School District. Over the last nine (9) years, I have had the opportunity to work closely with Sewickley Township in various ways, including our recent agreement in selling an easement to approve a local roadway, participation in local holiday parades, assistance for our students in clean up and beautification of Crabapple Pool, Playground of our Dreams Project that allowed us to put a playground in HW Good, library and community cleanup initiatives in the spring, and advertisements of community events. Our partnership has been, and continues to be, a positive one. Over the last two years, we have worked together in planning for the safety of our students during morning and afternoon commutes to school. Part of the planning process involved meetings and emails with PennDOT, Gibson-Thomas, and Sewickley Township Supervisors to discuss the needs of two of our schools with regards to speed limit signs and flashing lights. Throughout the various conversations, we discussed the need for flashers and signs specifically at HW Good. Some of the discussions involved the High School building, but the stance of the School District Board and Administration was always that HW Good needed to be a priority as that was the area with the greatest safety concerns. The District, in conjunction with the Township, applied for an ARLE Grant for HW Good Elementary in the hopes of receiving the grant, of which we were not awarded that grant. Needless to say, when the announcement from Governor Wolf came out in May, 2019 stating the Township received a grant for Yough High School, that we didn't know was applied for. Since May, the time the grant was approved, the District Solicitor has had conversations with the Township Solicitor in the hopes that they would be willing to discuss with the State a change in the positioning of the approved grant to HW Good Elementary as it is a more needed project for safety and is less money to initiate. Our understanding is that a request can be made to make that change. Upon speaking with Steve Gault from PennDOT, he has indicated that if the Township writes a letter changing the location, he believes it can be changed. I want to thank Mr. Merdian for his time over the last few days to listen and seek clarification. On behalf of myself, Yough School

Board, and our Building Administration, we are asking that for the safety of our elementary children, that the Township consider making this request to the State in the form of a letter. The District has taken precautions at the High School through sign installation and monitoring of school grounds during arrival and dismissal. Although we do the same at HW Good Elementary, there is limited space in the parking lot for parent pick up and a dangerous crest of a hill coming up to the school that when travelers speed makes it dangerous for our buses and parent drop off and pick up. Although the lights will not solve all the problems, we believe that it will deter people from speeding and increase awareness in the community area surrounding Bruno Fields and Crabapple Pool. Dr. Larcinese, Principal, was unable to attend tonight's meeting. Mr. Sutherland, the Principal of the High School, and Mrs. Trayter, our Director of Transportation, and Mr. Meyer our new Business Manager, are all in agreement that the true need is a HW Good Elementary. In the packets that I am handing out, you have pictures of the area, as well as a description of the need by Dr. Larcinese and a description of the lack of need at the High School by Mr. Sutherland, as well as copies of the submitted grants, a copy of Governor Wolf's announcements, and my comments that are being stated here today for your review. With this being said, I would ask the Supervisors to reconsider and submit a letter requesting a change of light placement to HW Good Elementary School as it is in the best interest of our students safety and security. Our partnership as a District with the Township has always revolved around what is in the best interest of students. I am hopeful that this premise will continue well into the future. Thank you for your time and please consider this request.

Jay Stevens read a timeline from when he started coming to the meetings in July, 2017 for Wineberry Ridge Court. From the beginning, the Developer needed to have a construction permit for the road. He put in a Right to Know and have not received the information yet on it. If the permit was put into effect, he would have had a vear's time to do all the infrastructure. We are going on four (4) years from when he first put in the builder's agreement. Has anybody been over to see the development and how bad it has been? The residents have moved trash from the bottom of the hill up to where we live so it can't be seen. There are snakes and mice underneath it. We have attended at least eight (8) different meetings and have not received any enforced satisfaction. We've had some help, but still nowhere. The Developer was given 30 to 45 days to complete the road and nothing has been touched. In that time, we have asked for a copy of the Engineer's road report. I think the road was complete in June. Once you got the report, and he had the report, he had 30 days to fix the road. Nothing's been done yet. Joe Kerber stated that he spoke with officials today and his timeline ends on October 10, 2019. At that point in time, the Conservation District and the Engineer will sit down and make a recommendation. Mr. Stevens stated that on July 17, 2019. Solicitor Kansler stated that he got a copy of that letter today. Who did that letter go to? Solicitor Kansler stated the letter from the engineer went to Mr. Serakowski. Solicitor Kansler stated that we are actively working on this issue. We can't go in specifics to exactly what we're doing. This isn't a concern falling on deaf ears. We are doing what we can to address the roadway and the storm water management. The drainage issues fall under the Conservation District and the permits that he has through them. Our concern is the road and we are addressing this issue. Brian Merdian stated we also have a report from Gibson-Thomas Engineering referencing Wineberry Ridge Estates. This was prepared by our Consulting Engineer and the letter is dated September 5, 2019. We all received copies, and it is a two page document that has 12 points of deficiency explaining in detail to Mr. Serakowski exactly what needs to be done. Mr. Stevens stated that the whole time Mr. Serakowski was there doing the base and the final coat for the road, there was an Engineer present. How can an Engineer let him do the road as it is? The first base coat only lasted four (4) months and is cracking. There is no crown in the road. Who will be responsible for keeping the road clear coming into the winter? There is still no guiderail at the bottom of the hill. Mr. Stevens's stated he has seen no indication that the Performance Bond is still in effect. Solicitor Kansler stated the road would not be accepted into the system if it was not constructed to the specifications and that remains to be Mr. Serakowski's problem. He got a copy of the Conservation District report and doesn't see how Mr. Serakowski can handle it. Mr. Kerber stated the storm water management is with the County. Mr. Kerber and Solicitor Kansler both stated they are continuing to work on this issue.

Geno Kerti stated he was at the August, 2019 meeting regarding Hildenbrand Road and asked what the status is of it being paved. Mr. Kerti shared pictures with the Supervisors of the condition Hildenbrand Road is in. Does it look like this meets the specs for a Township Road? Three (3) small holes were filled and that is it. Mr. Kerber stated that he will have the road crew go out tomorrow. Mr. Kerti stated the road needs paved. Mr. Kerber stated that the Township is in the process of getting payment from Sunoco to fix the road. The Township must receive payment from Sunoco first before the Township can pave the road.

Bob Janzef asked if we received information from Chevron on whether or not they are going to put the back flow preventers on their line that they proposed to put into the Yough River. Solicitor Kansler and Mr. Kerber stated it would be permitted through the State and we have no authority over that.

Alan Fossi stated that in the last two to three years, we've had about six or seven buildings demolished in the Herminie area. He thinks this is encouraging and we have a lot more that needs to be done. Also, sometimes we take some of groups in the Township for granted. He personally would like to mention, and apologizes if he left anyone out, our firemen who go out and put their lives on the line for the community. Our EMS and Sewickley Township Ambulance who are well equipped, well funded, and very professional. Our Library and volunteers that oversee the Easter Egg Hunt, Rabies Clinic, and the Father/Daughter dance. The Business Association that made a very generous donation to the Father/Daughter Dance. The Boy Scouts that do the luminaries and help residents with the Memorial in the spring for children that we have lost through the years. Mr. Fossi just wanted to make sure that we don't forget the citizens that do good deeds for our community. Thank you to Yough School District. They do a lot of things in the community. Especially, in the spring they, in conjunction with the Community College, had volunteers on a Sunday afternoon along with the High School Principal helping with landscaping on the bank of the Library. This group also had volunteers that went to Sewickley Creek to help with the clean-up.

Linda Knor asked Brian Merdian if he was still Chairman of the Sewickley Township Sewage Authority. She asked if the Sewage Authority was dissolved? Mr. Merdian stated it is not dissolved. She thought it was sold. Mr. Merdian stated the sale is still in the process. It just hasn't been finalized yet. Ms. Knor stated that she has property off Skyline Drive and wants to find out if the availability of sewage to it is still possible. Mr. Merdian stated for her to see him after the meeting to give her the point of contact at MAWC. They will be the potential buyer and they have taken over operation of the facility.

Scott Keteles is the owner of the Crystal Ballroom. He thanks Joe Kerber for getting some curbs fixed on Madison Avenue. He is now asking if f it there is a possibly of getting something done with the road in front of the ballroom, 3rd Street. If not paved, can the potholes be patched? They are dangerous for people crossing the street from the parking lot. He would prefer to see it paved completely. Joe Kerber stated it would not be paved this year due to having two projects started and they will carry us through until we get Sunoco's money. But patching the holes in front of the Ballroom can be done. Mr. Ketele's asked if paving could possibly be done next year. Brian Merdian stated It would depend on the storm water projects being done in the future. It would be worthless to pave if there are projects coming through that would tear up the paving. Mr. Keteles asked about the curb work on Madison Avenue, stating there is one area that was not taken care of. It's a cut out that was never fixed and possibly is there to drain water from Madison Avenue. Mr. Kerber stated it will be looked at.

Kathie Simpson wanted to state in reference to Dick Station Road, the Township did a wonderful job of paving the road. How much money did we get from the State to pave the road? Mr. Kerber stated the money received covered all expenses. Ms. Simpson asked if it was all spent on the paving of Dick Station Road? Mr. Kerber and Mr. Merdian both stated there were some overages and we're going to vote on it tonight to get paid for them. Ms. Simpson then asked when Slaughter Hollow Road would be paved? Mr. Kerber stated it would not be paved this year. Due to all the storm damage in the past two years, the entire paving budget has been spent on those roads that were washed out.
